THE SINGERS OF WESTERN RESERVE CHORALE WELCOME YOU TO THIS CELEBRATION OF AMERICAN MUSIC.

Today's concert features a broad spectrum of songs which only begins to explore the many genres of American music.

Both secular and sacred, these works have texts of American poets/lyricists or are settings of other texts by American composers. You will hear Spirituals arranged by Moses Hogan and William Dawson; traditional Americana songs with *America the Beautiful* (reimagined as *From Sea to Shining Sea*) and *Shenandoah*; *Nelly Bly*, a setting of the minstrel song by the 'Father of American Music', Stephen Foster; and a bit of jazz with Cole Porter's *In the Still of the Night*.

In addition to some very recognizable choral numbers, the program features the diverse musical styles of living composers including Shawn Kirchner's *Unclouded Day* (a setting of a text from a mid-western circuit preacher), *I Will Make a Way!* by Tom Trenney (an organist and composer trained locally at the Cleveland Institute of Music), *The Old Mill* (Kenneth Riggs' setting of 19th century poet/politician Thomas Dunn English), and *Sunrise* (a musical adaptation of Walt Whitman's "Give Me the Splendid, Silent Sun) by Michael Hennagin.

And to paraphrase a line from our piece by Dede Duson, we are glad that you will sit down and rest, allowing life to wait for a few moments to enjoy as we share the love of choral music.
